Sharing Christ...

The Big Story: Why We Need It

The Kingdom of God is Near

...the gospel Jesus taught was not just that he died for the penalty of my sins so I could go to heaven when I died. Instead Jesus preached, "The time has come....The kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news!"

(Dallas Willard)

The kingdom was marked by a new kind of people with a new kind of relationship with God and each other, living out a new kind of life – one that exuded love for God and neighbor. This love needed to be expressed through evangelism, world missions, social justice, financial stewardship and vocational calling, among others. The kingdom of God was meant to heal the planet. To me, this finally felt like good news, not just for Christians but also for the world.

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Three Movements: The Direction of the Big Story

1) From Decision to	
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First, we need a gospel summary that moves away from a one-time decision. With God's grace we train to become like Jesus and grow in him so we can be his expression of love here and now. We become the kind of good we want to see in the world. Our faith is then real and practical, one that allows us to interact with God on an everyday basis and be changed by his presence. Sure, we still mess up. But for many of us who have no other way to describe our lives except as a living hell, this is welcome news, possibly even good news. Thus, the gospel should include a call to transformation in the present.

The revolution of Jesus is in the first place and continuously a revolution of the human heart and spirit.

(Dallas Willard, Renovation of the Heart)

And we all, who with unveiled faces contemplate the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit. (2 Corinthians 3:18)



2) From Individual to	
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Christian faith is expressed in community – it's not an option. In fact, no faith exists without community. The reflection of the kingdom of God shines through God's people when they're gathered and reconciled. Paul compares Christians to different body parts: though we're different, we all make up one body.

Spiritual formation cannot, in the nature of the case, be a 'private' thing, because it is a matter of whole-life transformation. You need to seek out others in your community who are pursuing the renovation of the heart.

Only if you are part of a community of believers seeking to resemble, serve, and love Jesus will you ever to get know him and grow into his likeness. (Tim Keller)

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it.

(1 Corinthians 12:27)

3) From Afterlife to ______

Our gospel presentations may have allowed people to think they're part of the kingdom without needing to embrace the purpose of loving and blessing others.

But Jesus enticed people into a kingdom mission from the outset. "Come follow me and I will send you out to fish for people." His initial invitation included a selfless call to love and influence others for the sake of the kingdom. And his kingdom is near. We are invited into a space where God is really in charge, where what he wants to happen actually does happen. What's more, we can enter into it now, before we die. That's good news – the gospel. As citizens of this kingdom, we're called to spread this kingdom outward.

But Jesus' own gospel of the kingdom was not that the kingdom was about to come, or had recently come, into existence. If we attend to what he actually said, it becomes clear that his gospel concerned only the new accessibility of the kingdom to humanity through himself.

1) Introduction: Aching for a ______

Just like hunger points to food and thirst points to water, so our ache for a better world means that a better world either once existed or will one day exist."

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Response
