Five Contagious Faith Styles

It's much like the topic of spiritual gifts. While we should be ready and willing to serve wherever God leads us, we'll usually be most fruitful – and more fulfilled – when we're serving in areas that fit our natural, God-given areas of giftedness. And because the Holy Spirit knows this (and designed it that way), he'll most often lead us to serve in ways that are consistent with who he made us to be.

It was the discovery of which styles were not mine, as well as which one is, that liberated me to get back on the playing field in reaching others for Christ. Finding your own natural approach will likely be liberating for you as well – but so will understanding various styles that don't particularly reflect your personality.

Those who fit the Selfless-Serving approach are naturally attuned to the needs of the people around them, and they find delight in meeting those needs. They usually work behind the scenes, and their efforts can often go unnoticed to everyone except the person who is being served. But because they are others-centered, they don't mind serving without a spotlight or any kind of fan-fare to keep them motivated. They find joy in simply serving, and if that can be used by God to draw the person closer to him, that's all the better.

Those with the Story-Sharing style are skilled (or can become skilled) at articulating the details of their experiences with God and his grace. They illustrate in an experiential way the reality that life with God is better – even in hard times – and that anything given up to know and follow him is well worth the price.

Key Skills For Every Christian

- Use Questions to Draw Out Your Friend's Spiritual Beliefs
- Communicate Your Story around a Natural Outline
 - a. Discovery What did you discover that helped shape your spiritual journey?
 - b. Decision What did you decide based on that discovery?
 - c. Difference What difference did that decision make in your life?
- Relate Your Story to Your Friend's Situation

Cautions Concerning the Story-Sharing Style

- Embrace Your Story
- Be Honest
- Tailor to Your Audience
- Speak in Plain English

- Clarify the Question
- Study Up
- Admit It When You Don't Know
- Win People, Not Arguments
- Expect a Little Tension



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But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? And how can they believe in him if they have never heard about him? And how can they hear about him unless someone tells them? (Romans 10:14)

Truth-Telling types are bold, confident and direct. They're effective at getting to the point and bringing truth to bear in a variety of situations. They tend to have hard-hitting personalities and they're often action-oriented leaders. They don't like a lot of small talk, and they don't beat around the bush. They zero in on what's important and they generally do so quickly.
